Eddie asks, “a what?” Angelo explains, “this car has been heavily modified for agility racing.” Eddie says, “that makes sense. Not everyone has seen Kathy's car yet and, finding out that she has bought one, the group comes to check it out. Everyone is impressed, and Tessa falls in love with it. Tessa, like Kathy, thinks the Porsche 914 is cute. While everyone is looking at the car, Kathy and Eddie remove the top and stow it in the rear trunk. Kathy explains to Eddie, "she has no boobs. She's all muscle. She'll sink like a rock."

Eddie laughs, and replies, "he's made fun of me for years. How come I don't take the dope and I don't sell the dope? And, by the way, Braden makes fun of the Chuckie too. How come it's not Braden's fault that the Chuckie is in jail?" Eddie's mother tells Eddie, "sometimes I think the Kathryn Black must be taking the dope herself."



Kathy asks Eddie and his mother, “why do you guys call him ‘the little Chuckie,’ and call her ‘the Kathryn Black?’” Eddie’s mother explains to Kathy, “I refer to them as ‘the’ because they are more like a thing than a person. They don’t even act like people. They’re mean. Eddie’s father once said a 2 by 4 has more sense than the little Chuckie. None of them have any sense in their heads.” Kathy replies, “well, you can’t argue with that. At least 2 by 4s don’t throw bricks at people.” Eddie tells Kathy, “Mark’s mother refers to her in the same way.” Kathy tells Eddie, “you do too. And now, so do I!” Eddie replies, “oh yeah! I guess we all do.” Kathy mentions, “yeah. The little Chuckie definitely has a few screws loose.”

Today, Eddie and Kathy are working out in Eddie’s home gym. Eddie cannot let Tessa beat him in the rematch, so he is working out a little more than usual. Kathy is working out more than usual as well. Eddie tells Kathy, “you’re getting really strong. Are you still thinking about the discus?” Kathy replies, “yeah, I am! She's catching up." Paula remarks, "yeah, I can see that." Barbara tells Kathy and Paula, "but, watch after the turn. Eddie will be way ahead. He must be really hammering that wall with his legs. That's how he is staying ahead. Watch, here he goes." Right before the wall, Eddie and Tessa are nearly tied, with Eddie having a slight advantage. Eddie does his final flip turn of the race and, after the turn, has again gained a few yards over Tessa. Kathy exclaims, "wow! I can see that!"

As the last lap is underway, Tessa is eroding away at Eddie's lead. In the last few yards, Tessa nearly catches Eddie, but Eddie touches the wall right before Tessa. Erika finishes in fourth place, several yards behind

Tessa, slightly ahead of Mark, who finishes in fifth place. Wendy completes her initiation rite, and finishes in a distant last place. And, taking first place is Lena. It is comforting to the spectators knowing that the lifeguard won the race.

They all get out of the pool, and Andrea, blowing her whistle, announces that the pool is open again. Barbara tells Eddie and the rest, "Lena won the race. And, now that the race is over, everyone sits back to relax. They make plans to meet at the track later this week. Eddie mentions that it would be a good time to throw the discus. Erika mentions that she would like to try that as well. Erika is getting interested in sports because, after working with the track team, she sees how much fun competition can be, especially if you win all the time.

While they are lying around in the sun, Tessa asks Eddie, “so, do you have any advice on how to improve my flip turn?” Eddie replies, “if you want more power in your flip turn, do squats and leg presses.” Barbara mentions, “that’s important. That’s how Eddie beat you. If Eddie gained three yards on you at each turn, that’s nine yards during the whole race. Eddie only won by two yards.” Tessa replies, “wow! I totally get it now. I definitely get it!” Tessa then tells Barbara, “now, I know why you’re going to school for Exercise Science. The swimming coach never saw things like that.”

Tessa is now actually happy that Eddie beat her and that Barbara noticed why Eddie won. If Tessa had won the race, no one would have noticed that her turns could benefit by more power. All of this sudden interest in the discus came from Mr. Zunde throwing the discus over Mr. Crum’s head after the last meet of the Spring

Kathy quickly gets her beach towel, and carefully wraps the discus, and places it neatly in the front trunk. She closes the trunk, waiting for Bobby B. and Erika to walk up. Kathy tells Eddie, "I'm going to show them that the discus is a whole lot more special than the shot-put." Eddie, Kathy, Bobby B., and Erika hang around and talk, as they are waiting for Mark and Paula.

Mark and Paula arrive shortly after, riding their bicycles. Mark tells Kathy, "you guys are going to get all out of shape driving around." Kathy smiles, and tells Mark, "we had to transport the discus. You don't expect us to just carry it around like a Frisbee, do you?" Paula, immediately knowing that Eddie and Kathy are up to something, replies, "oh yeah. That's right. I forgot about that." Paula can't wait to see what Kathy has up her sleeve.

Kathy opens her front trunk, and slowly unwraps the discus she wrapped earlier. Using two hands, she carefully removes the discus, and holds it with two hands far in front of her body. She turns around, and hands the discus to Eddie, who takes it with both arms extended. Eddie then brings the discus closer to his body, as Kathy says, "okay, the discus has been properly removed from the transportation vehicle." Paula mentions, "yeah. That was silly of me. I forgot you guys were bringing the discus." Kathy gets Eddie's father's surveying tape out of the trunk, treating it with just as much care. Bobby B. knows exactly what they are up to, and says nothing. They then head to the track to time Erika.

Kathy and Paula will be running with Erika. They decide that Bobby B. will be the Starter, and Eddie and Mark will be the Timekeepers. Eddie and Mark head to the finish line, and the women get ready to run. Kathy tells Bobby B., "the command is 'on your marks', 'set,' and then 'go.' But, give us at least two or three seconds before you say 'go.'" Bobby B. replies, "got it."

At the finish line, they hear Eddie yell out, "we're ready!" Bobby B. tells the three contestants, "on your marks." He waits, and the three runners appear ready. He announces, "set." Paula mentions, "and, that's with no starting blocks, and no one watching." Kathy adds, "yeah, and those weren't our best times."

Erika, who will be a sophomore next year, has never tried out for a team. She has been living in her own world of bodybuilding. She lifts weights, stretches, and runs a little, which is pretty much all she does as far as working out. But, she does a lot of it. Erika has never applied her physical abilities to the sports field before. It's anyone's guess what else she might be good at. Perhaps next year everyone will find out.

The group heads over to the field area, where everyone wants to give the discus a try. Eddie is going to go first and, although he is not an expert, will show everyone what he knows of the technique. Eddie and Mark lay their stopwatches on the grass, a few feet behind the discus pad. Bobby B. clears his throat, and tells Erika, "did you see that?" Erika asks, "see what?" Bobby B. points out, "they just laid their stopwatches on the ground, in the dirt." Eddie whispers to Mark, "we're busted. There's no way out of this one." Bobby B. tells Eddie and Mark, "you guys are going to have to clean and sterilize those stopwatches later today." Paula whispers to Kathy, "pay backs are hell." After demonstrating what he knows regarding how to throw the discus, Eddie throws the discus. Eddie goes out in the field to retrieve the discus and, using the tape, measures 189 feet, 3 inches. Eddie is happy with that throw, which is a little farther than his last throw a while ago.



Mark goes second, and throws 184 feet, 7 inches. Either Eddie's or Mark's throw could have earned a medal in this past Spring's State invitational meet.

When it becomes Erika's turn, she practices a few times with everyone's help. She thinks she has the technique down well enough to make a throw. Everyone stands behind Erika as she makes her first attempt. Erika throws the discus, which flies off center, but a lot farther than anyone expected. Kathy and Erika retrieve the discus and take the measurement. They measure 115 feet, 4 inches, which is awesome for a first throw.

Bobby B., who has thrown the discus for fun a few times in the past, steps up to the discus pad and takes a turn. Mark tells Bobby B., "don't throw it too far. You'll have to run out there to pick it up yourself." Bobby B. tosses the discus about five feet, and asks, "how's that?" Mark replies, "a little better than Chuckie and a lot better than Jimmy O'Brien." Bobby B. gets on the discus pad again, and makes a real attempt this time. Bobby B. throws the discus, which does not fly too far. Bobby B. goes out to retrieve the discus, but doesn't bother taking a measurement. He's decided to stick to the shot-put.

They all throw a few more times, and get a good workout retrieving the discus. Erika's best throw of the afternoon is 130 feet, 9 inches, which is far better than anyone ever expected. Kathy mentions to Erika, "your throws are on par with Springer." Erika asks, "who's Springer?" Kathy tells her, "he's the guy that's been throwing the discus for the team all last year." Erika replies, "oh, that guy. He wins most of the time." Kathy points out, "then, so can you!" Kathy wonders how Erika can be so naive. She's worked with the team for the entire year, and does not know the name of the team's discus thrower. That afternoon, everyone walks away with the understanding that they are better athletes than they originally thought. To them, they think their level of performance is normal. But, persons of high athletic ability tend to underestimate their relative competence, and erroneously come to the conclusion that their level of performance is closer to average than it actually is. Likewise, people of lower athletic ability have a tendency to overestimate their abilities, and erroneously come to the conclusion that their level of performance is far beyond what it actually is.

As they are leaving the field, Bobby B. reminds Eddie and Mark, “hey! Don’t forget to clean and sterilize your stopwatches. While they are sitting in the car, Kathy tells Eddie, “there’s definitely something up with Erika.” Eddie asks, “like what?” Kathy replies, “well, for one, she didn’t even know Springer was the discus thrower.” Eddie tells her, “yeah, but she knows Bobby B. really well to make up for it.” Kathy tells Eddie, “I don’t know. I just can’t put my finger on it.” Eddie responds, telling Kathy, “she just seems a little naive. She’s only a freshman.” Kathy mentions, “yeah, I would think that too if it wasn’t for the comment she made at the pizzeria when Bobby B. wanted three breasts, and she said, ‘I only have two.’ That is not naive.”

Eddie goes on to explain, “she said she does bodybuilding. Bodybuilders generally live in their own world.” Kathy also comes to the conclusion that Erika lives in her own world, quite unaware of much that goes on around her. Kathy tells Eddie, “I’ll go with that for now, but I really think there’s something else to her story.” Eddie mentions, “well, if there is, maybe someday you’ll find out. As Eddie is holding Kathy face up in the water as she is floating, she tells him, “you know, we really shouldn’t be in the pool right now.” Eddie replies, “this is going to be a good one, Katarina Karakova. I can tell. But, tell me why.” Kathy explains, “well, you have two dirty stopwatches that need to be cleaned and sterilized, and a

discus that has been thrown into the dirt a few dozen times today.” Eddie exclaims, “yeah! That’s right! I knew I should have been doing something else! I may not be able to sleep tonight with all that hanging over my head.” Kathy tells him, “you’re such a slacker.” Eddie replies, “yeah, I know. I’m sure Mark is home cleaning his stopwatch right now with Paula. His stopwatch is going to be sparkly bright.”

After a while, Kathy tells Eddie, “hey, let’s go back to Hawaii!” Eddie replies, “yeah. Let’s do that. We were going to take Mark and Paula.” Kathy exclaims, “yeah! That’s right! Now, I really want fried chicken again.” They float around the pool a while longer, relaxing in the late afternoon sun. Every so often they say something to each other but, after a while, they kiss more than they talk. Time gets away from them, but they have a lot of it because it is now Summer. After they get out of the pool, they make plans with Mark and Paula to go to the beach.
